LANDUSE: Russ Walker presented a slide show about what the Bears Ears Monument will encompass close to Moab, if passed. It will cut off the last tip of Chicken Corners and part of Lockhart Basin, which takes off of Chicken Corners at this end and closes off Cathedral Arch & Angel Arch.

Mark Pope reminded everyone about the conversation he had with Josh Hansen, Manager of the new Raptor State Park going in just North of Moab by highway 191, in April of 2023 about the fee/permit for our crossing on the road we have always used for Copper Ridge. Josh said "In lieu of a fee for park fees the RR4W could put in 32 person hours a year instead. No toilet work, just working on the roads." We now owe 60 hours before the end of the year.

He is now alone out there and has no one to help. He is looking for help from us and has 200 signposts to put up. This is a great way for us to get

engaged for our new National Park. No decisions were made about when this should happen. But – members and non-members far and wide will be invited to help – we'll post it on the website and our Facebook page when it is happening.

The Dome Plateau trail on Monday of Labor Day will line up at the campground. The leader, Jedidiah Hazlett, is also part of the team making breakfast and needs to help clean up before heading out.

Jason Taylor, Moab City Councilman, sent this e-mail to the Club:

EASTER JEEP SAFARI 2024 -WAS A SUCCESS

It seemed a little quieter than usual, but it really wasn't. We have seen a shuffling of people signing up for trail days. It used to be busy on the last weekend because of families coming down from up north. But it has shifted to the first weekend and mid-week.

•The first mix-up ever between ATV and EJS leaders happened on Hell's Revenge on the last Saturday of EJS. A leader of one of the ATV tour companies pulled his trail right in front of Mark Bryson's permitted EJS trail. After everyone calmed down the trails continued.

•MONITORS- Patsy Kraft & her son Jake Wyperd, have done a great job getting monitors together and solving problems that arise during the event. These people are vital (and required by our BLM permit) on certain trails where there was a history of trail widening and land abuse and lack of respect that we have had a permit for 58 years for one week of the year. They are sentinels and a lot of them are retired leaders and gunners and are there to make your trips just a little easier CHEERS TO ALL OF YOU!

•VENDING – this was the calmest year (60% of the vendors we had two years ago. The Economy is tough. The Giveaway on Friday night saw one-third of the people sitting in the arena as in the past.

•A church was given permission to have their Easter Sunday services in the Arena this year on Sunday after EJS.

• There were four trail leaders that didn't pick up their groovers and trail packets for their trails for Easter Saturday – Easter Sundays were all picked up. This will be resolved with better directions for everyone next year; several were new last-minute leaders, and those new trail leaders get a shout out for innovative thinking – they got extra waivers from trails lining up close to them and wrote everyone's name, license, etc. on notebook paper or an envelope, and ended up with 100% of the people on their trails identified.

• Registration Volunteers, thanks to all those who worked in the registration area helping registrants get where they are going and with returned lists & putting new trail lists together. The aftermath of EJS would take a whole lot longer if it weren't for all of you.

•The Merchandise crew did well this year – all the blankets were sold and most of the MUD pins.

BRC LOOKING AHEAD (The news below sent to us via e-mail from BRC.)



Thank you to our supporters who showed up for the first cour hearing on the Moab trails closures

"I have never seen the motorized recreation community more mobilized and united than I've seen it right now, and we need to keep up the momentum. We have big plans to rise to this challenge, and this is what we see coming:

Legal Challenge to Moab Trail Closures – in late February we participated in a hearing in Federal Court. Unfortunately, our request for an injunction against the decision to close 317 miles of popular off-road routes in Moab was denied. This was the first step of our federal court challenge to this decision, and we will spend considerable time on this fight this year." BRC is waging a good fight for the US PUBLIC: Join up to keep updated on what's going on in YOUR country with your land! • The Securities Exchange Commission was trying to make it possible for a big time sell-off of our public lands to corporations on Wall St. Why: to create a new type of company called a "Natural Asset Company" that would own

the ecosystem services provided by nature. Thousands of individuals responded to the call to share feedback on the proposal with the SEC. With millions of citizens voicing their concerns, members of Congress started taking a serious look at the proposal. On January 17th, the SEC announced that they were withdrawing the rule because of the public backlash they were receiving. **NEXT big threat to Public Land Access: 30X30 Agenda – Locking up Western public lands to create Solar Farms! This was the 10th year that Jeep Corporation executives from France and around the country came to Moab to specifically help on a RR4W trail repair project. Club members joined the Jeep Corporation executives and the BLM at La Boca Arch on Dome Plateau to repair damage to the trail in the widening of the parking area in front of the arch. Jeep has



been working with the RR4W since the early 80's.
